MEDIA ADVISORY: MINISTER NATHI MTHETHWA TO LAUNCH "ALBINISM ACTIVISM CAMPAIGN" AT JOBURG THEATRE ON 4 MAY 2018

Minister Nathi Mthethwa will launch the "Albinism Activism Campaign" in Johannesburg tomorrow. The launch will be taking place alongside the performance of the theatre production by Molepo Theatre Projects in association with "Nkgo Ya Metsi" called "Mama, I Want the Black That You Are". The production is- according to its producers- "A compelling theatre production based on interviews and real lives of people living in with albinism".

Worthy to note, is that this launch is taking place during Africa Month. It is common cause that on this continent, people with albinism have been persecuted, killed and dismembered, and graves of albinos dug up and desecrated. At the same time, people with albinism have also been ostracised and even killed for exactly the opposite reason, because they are presumed to be cursed and bring bad luck. The persecutions of people with albinism take place mostly in Sub-Saharan African communities, especially among East Africans.

In South Africa, as recently as April this year, the murder of a 13-year-old albino girl and the stealing of body parts from a 28-year-old albino man just hours after he was buried left Mpumalanga residents angry and fearing for the lives of other albino people. In Mpumalanga, there is an ongoing court case where three to four men stand accused of kidnapping two children from their home in Hlalanikahle who were later found murderedalso in April this year.

It is in recognition of these and the ongoing prejudice shown against people with Albinism that the Department of Arts and Culture recognises the need to raise awareness and educate communities about Albinism.

Members of the media fraternity are invited to attend this event (encompassing the performance of "Mama, I want the Black that you are" and the launch of the Albinism Activism Project Launch) which will take place as follows:

he atmosphere at the launch of the play Mama I want the Black That You Are, was so thick with mixed emotions that you'd be forgiven for laughing, crying or doing both at once.

The play proved that dealing with the matter of people living with Albinism is a sensitive issue.

The opening night was on Friday night at the Joburg Theatre in Braamfontein, Joburg. The play will leave for a national school

tour soon.

Referring to people with the condition, Minister of Arts and Culture Nathi Mthethwa said: "This event comes at a time when we are talking about Africa and Africans.

"We cannot perpetuate and propagate selfhate. We hunt that among us and chop it to

pieces.

"A nation is about its soul. Let's organise ourselves and say 'thus far and never again'. There's no cure you'll find in another person's flesh!" Mthethwa said.

He said this must be fought to the bitter end

"just as we fought racism".

He encouraged those in the crowd to show support by passing on the message: #Albinis-mActivismCampaign.

The producer of the show, Mpho Molepo, thanked the minister and the deputy minister of social department, Hendrietta Bogopane-

Zulu, for their support. He said they had been knocking on many doors without success. "It's probably because of the sensitive subject matter that we couldn't get an ear," Mpho said.

The show is written and directed by Arthur Molepo.

Director of the Albinism Society of South Africa, Nomasonto Mazibuko, called for a moment of silence before delivering her speech. "As we celebrate Africa month, we also celebrate the parents of children with albinism, because they are torn apart emotionally. These days, we no longer lock our doors with keys only, we also push dustbins and other objects to make sure we can hear when someone tries to come in," she said.

The audience was entertained by a moving song from Mpho. He was accompanied by Bob90 and the Binisc choir, made up of people living with oblinion

living with albinism.

The lyrics of the song: "Siyabuza, senzeni na? Sibulawelani?" led to people in the crowd breaking into tears. The crowd soon joined in and sang along the choir.

Deputy minister Bogopane-Zulu said it was amazing that people did not want to be called kaffirs, but they have the audacity to call others monkeys.

Molepos tackle prejudice, myths about albinism

LECIENDARY television and stage actor Arthur Molego continues to address social issues with his works.

In his latest endeavour littled Atoms, I Want the Block that You Are, he tackles the projudice against people with albinism.

The show is on at the State Thestre in Pretoria, and is produced by his son Mgdo of Rhythm City Imm. It Scatures Pulsing Molebalsi,

Regins Ndiovu, Ntsouki Mathiba. Harriet Manasseta, and Misso Dube.

Mideps, who also appears in the SABCt souple Steem Soom as the no-consense captain Maletana, has been iteling to write a play tackling the challenges of people with albeatan for years.

The idea was inspired by a little girl with albinism who was living around his neighbourhood, the was always ascluded from other children.

"When I asked her why she was not playing with them, she would say, 'they don't like me, and I don't know why', he says. "This lift me hard. Since I'm always

The subject of albinion is more retevant than before because of the recent attacks on people with albinion, superially in KwaZudu Natal.

In writing the play, bloicps interviewed many people with albinium.

Molego says the challenges range from not being given equal opportunities to being killed.

The story is fold through a 15year-old called Matinkain who has albitism.

5the is haunted by a life of abuse and the secrets she has to keep from everyone, including her mother. Molepo says in his research he came across the "crazy" myth that people with albinism "hold magic powers".

Molepo may through the play people will toarn a lot about the shallenges and realise that we are all human.

"I want people to change these ridiculum perceptions they have."

Asked about collaborating with his son, Molepo explains that Mpho

employs weeking with him.

Molepo, one of the pioneers of black theetre, taught drams and arting at the Markot Theatre Lab, and one of his products is the acclaimed actress Harriet Manameta.

In addition he has written scripts and directed Generarions.

BRIEF BACKGROUND OF THE WORKSHOPS IN LIMPOPO

Nkgo Ya Metsi hosted a successful workshop in Limpopo in 2024.
